

Burglars are actively targeting homes in our area working under the cover of darkness. But there are some simple steps which you can take to greatly decrease your chance of falling victim to this distressing crime.

These are:

- Leave a light on in using a timer switch to make your home look occupied even if it is not. It will encourage burglars to give it a wide berth. This simple safeguard need not break the bank as modern energy efficient bulbs cost less than a penny a day to run.
- Shut and lock all doors and windows as one in three burglaries are down to homes being left insecure.
- Remember to put your alarm on when you go out and also when you go to bed.

TRUE GRIT

When it comes to forging a path in life, Aaron Block has already learnt that at times it can be a rocky road to success.

But the plucky 17-year-old apprentice landscaper remains clearly undaunted - even when confronted with the worst that the elements can throw at him!

The former Bedford High School pupil, who left school last summer with 12 GCSEs, is getting plenty of hands on experience helping to lay the foundations for a path at Lune Aquaduct in Lancaster.

Aaron's apprenticeship is being delivered by environmental charity Groundwork and is sponsored by Leigh Neighbours, a community project which aims to give local people a say in how £1M worth of lottery money will be invested in the area over the next 10 years.

Aaron, from Findlay Street in Leigh, says: "It's a fantastic opportunity to be earning whilst I'm learning. As well as lots of practical training, I'm also developing in other ways, for example improving my team building and communication skills. From day one you feel like you're part of a team and that you're making a valuable contribution. I'm confident this is the direction I want my future career to take," he adds.

Over to YOU!

Leigh Neighbours Project Board is responsible for managing £1M of National Lottery money - and we're doing it in partnership with you. During our extensive consultation with local residents, you told us what your priorities were, from tackling ASB to improving access to leisure facilities.

What we now need are more of your ideas, together with your vision and your passion. A Resident's Fund is available to help with the costs of delivering projects which meet our criteria and achieve our shared objectives. And we can also help out with practical guidance, too. So what are you waiting for?! Here's a couple of ways you might be able to help support your local community...

Baby Change Facilities

You told us that there's a real need for high quality baby change facilities so Leigh Neighbours Partnership Board has a small pot of money set aside to support local organisations within the Leigh Neighbours project area which are open to the public and which would like to have baby change facilities.



We are able to match fund works to a total value of £2,000 (we'll provide a maximum of £1,000 at a ratio of 1:1) We'll want to know how many people with children under 36 months you would realistically expect to use your new facilities and the reasons why we should support your application.
