The 6-year-old pupil from Leigh Central was one of many youngsters who came along to our recent Be Seen, Be Safe workshop, organised in a bid to help keep children safer on our roads this winter.

The event, hosted by Leigh Neighbours in partnership with Gearing Up, provides an opportunity for bikes to be serviced free of charge in preparation for winter weather conditions, and aims to make children travelling by bike or on foot more visible to motorists during the darker evenings.

Mum, Sarah Jackson, says: "This is a great idea! It makes sense for parents to take every precaution possible when it comes to protecting their children, and this free event gives mums and dads a little extra peace of mind. As well as getting their bikes checked over, our kids also received some really practical gifts, including hi-vis vests, bike lights and reflective accessories to hang from their bags. I'm really grateful to Leigh Neighbours and Gearing Up for what they're doing in the community."

## GREATER MANCHESTER FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE

**Firefighters have spoken out about the impact of having stones and bricks thrown at them when responding to incidents. Following a recent spate of attacks, Greater Manchester Fire and Rescue Service (GMFRS) has released a video featuring personal experiences of two firefighters who have been targeted while protecting the community.**

In the video, firefighters talk about the impact of these incidents, which potentially put people's lives at risk. Crew Manager Pete Wilmot said: "When you get attacked it's frustrating. We're only there to put fires out so people don't get hurt, we're just normal people that want to go home to our families. It is becoming more common and it does make my crew quite angry. It's upsetting sometimes."

Group Manager for Bolton and Wigan, Lee Coleman, said: "We are seeing an increase in attacks on our firefighters, particularly in Bolton and Wigan, and we are doing everything we can with our partners to identify those involved. All our fire appliances have 360 degree CCTV cameras and crew in Greater Manchester are now trialling body worn cameras that allow us to record incidents that occur away from fire engines. Any footage that captures attacks on our crews will be handed to the police and people can be prosecuted."

# Incredible Edible: eat your landscape movement coming to Leigh!

Members of the Leigh Neighbours management board were delighted to host the founder of a radical urban gardening movement which is taking root in communities across the globe.

Pam Warhurst visited the Leigh Neighbours project area in late October to explain the principles behind her *Incredible Edible* concept - and in so doing, planted here in Leigh the seed of an idea that she originally germinated ten years ago in her hometown of Todmorden, West Yorkshire.

The principle behind *Incredible Edible* is simple: to encourage guerrilla gardeners to plant fruit, herbs and veggies in accessible public spaces and un-used communal patches for the entire community to use. And it's clearly caught on! Over the past decade, the movement has grown from small herb gardens and plots to more than 100 schemes across the country which include edible canal towpaths and sprouting cemeteries!

Addressing the Leigh Neighbours board, Pam (who coincidentally grew up in Leigh) described with passion how this simple initiative puts local food right at the heart of communities. "*Incredible Edible* is all about growing food and supporting local food businesses, encouraging people to taste fresh local produce, and promoting healthier and happier lifestyles. There's so many possibilities, just roll up your sleeves and build a world around food!"

She adds: "We've even invented a form of tourism, it's called vegetable tourism and, believe it or not, people come from all over the world to poke around in our raised beds."

Jan Eckersley, Vice Chair of Leigh Neighbours, says: "It was a pleasure to welcome Pam, and a delight to hear her speak with such energy and enthusiasm about *Incredible Edible*. It's certainly given us all here at Leigh Neighbours plenty of food for thought."
